

I can't think of a better way to the day than with my quilty friends doing quilty things.







Excellent idea, keep working on your quilt.


6 x 60 quilts will fit perfectly in the space right by your front


June Guild Meeting Tools and Tips





Sew Much Hope

As with many of you, I first became aware of the charity organization Sew Much Hope when I saw their booth at the Utah Quilting and Sewing Marketplace. I had walked up to the booth simply to say hi to my friend Charon Mauritsen, who was working the booth as a member of the board of directors, but I walked away so inspired by the poignant stories that I knew I needed to do something to help. Charon (pronounced "Sharon") told me about women in Guatemala, Zambia, and Haiti who had been exploited and abused, living in hopeless conditions, who found hope again after being provided with sewing machines, lessons and materials. These machines gave them the independence they needed to provide for themselves and rise above the deplorable conditions around them.

According to their website, the mission of Sew Much Hope is to provide "sewing machines to refugees in the US and others in need abroad to foster self-reliance and help end generational poverty". They work in partnership with other organizations to get the machines to those who need them most.

It all began with a man named Gino Rich who was a truck driver for 30 years. As he travelled, he would go to thrift stores, buy old sewing machines, add hand-cranks, and then find someone to give them to. Over the years he became so passionate about the work that he began to inspire those he came in contact with. In fact, Charon told me that "everyone who has gotten involved (with Sew Much Hope) is because of Gino."

My first introduction to him was when I called the number on the website to find a place to take the two machines I wanted to donate. Gino was instantly engaging and I could hear the passion in his voice for this work. Among many other moving stories he said,

"the machines that go to Africa save lives, the machines that go to South America change lives, and the machines that are given to refugees here touch lives."

There are people and businesses all over who are catching his vision. A lawyer in Salt Lake named Ted got so inspired that he got involved and then encouraged Gina and Moana of UQSM to get involved. When I went to drop off my machines at the Blend-Tec headquarters in Orem I was met by the owner himself, Tom Dickson (who you may know from the Will it Blend? ads), who helped get them out the car to take them up to a workshop they have on site to help refurbish the machines. He had also caught Gino's vision and was excited to be involved.

If you would like to become involved with this important work, here are 5 immediate needs:

- 1. More repairmen are needed to refurbished the donated machines. Gino and Charon both told me that they are looking for retired senior citizens who are willing to tinker with machines. As Gino said, "tell them they can golf in heaven, but right now there is work to be done and lives to be saved." If you know of someone who might enjoy helping out, please email Gino at sewmuchhope101@gmail.com or call (801) 706-0301.
- 2. Donate a working sewing machine. Durable machines from the 1940's-1960's will receive hand cranks or treadles to be used in areas without reliable electricity. Electric machines are used for refugees and in schools, orphanages, and community centers with reliable electricity.
- 3. Donate to money to help buy fabric, machine parts and equipment such as chairs for sewing centers.
- 4. Women who have sewing and teaching skills and who can afford to pay for their own travel are needed to go train women to use the sewing machines.
- 5. There is a group going to Rwanda who needs fabric, 9-10 sewing machines (there is reliable electricity in this area), 2 instructors, and money to purchase 20 chairs.
