Getting to Know Our Bees -- **Alpine Quilt Group**

We had the opportunity at our February meeting of hearing from Maureen Tuttle about That Alpine Quilt Group. She showed a quilt she made as a result of an hourglass block exchange in the group. "That Alpine Quilt Group" started about 20 years ago. At some point people started calling it That Alpine Quilt Group because they didn't know the group's name. And the name stuck! This Bee has about 40 members and is open to anyone interested. It meets at 8 PM the last Tuesday of the month at the LDS Church at 200 N. Main Street in Alpine. Flora Gillman and Paula McKinley are the "quilt sheriffs" who take turns being in charge of meetings. The group enjoys a program each month, and occasionally in the summer they have a backyard "sit and sew" meeting. They sponsor a quilt show each July in conjunction with Alpine Days. The group also collects \$10 in dues each year to help defray the cost of creating and giving something to a charitable cause, such as Festival of Trees. Soak the quilt in the mixture and then hand-wash it with a mild soap for a bright, reconditioned quilt. The natural ingredients are safe, and there's no danger of damaging the quilt. We only have about four and a half months to finish our quilt entries for the Springville Museum of Art Quilt Show!. Hopefully, you are making something wonderful to enter in the show. Entries will be accepted at the museum July 21st and 22nd from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. You may enter up to two quilts with an entry fee of \$15 per quilt. Remember that quilts made from kits (where the pattern and fabrics are sold together in one package) are not eligible.

The show will be open to the public from July 29 through September 23rd. Entries will be available for pick up September 26th through the 30th. The top prizes will be Best of Show, Solitaire Hand Quilting, Solitaire Machine Quilting, and the Director's Award. There will also be at least

10 Awards of Excellence, the Show Committee Award, 3 Judge's Choice Awards, Viewer's Choice, and several Honorable Mentions. Trunk Shows will be on the evening of Wednesday, August 2nd and the afternoon of Thursday, August 3rd. Scammers Beware! We're on to you! By Maureen Tuttle

Recently we had a pretty savvy scammer try to scam some funds from the quilt guild. Using an internet “mask” they sent an email that looked like it came from me to our treasurer, asking for a check to be sent to a “vendor” in another state. After investigating, we learned that this vendor was actually an unsuspecting older lady who had been friended on Facebook by this scammer who was also trying to take advantage of her. Fortunately everything came to light before we lost any money and before this lady lost any money. So just a few pointers and reminders:

Don't accept a friendship on social media from anyone you don't personally know. Don't click on a link in an email that you aren't absolutely positive is legitimate. Instead, go to your browser and type in the website to make sure it's real. If an email doesn't sound right, or your instincts tell you something might be off, check it out thoroughly before responding in any way. No legitimate company will ask you to enter or change your personal financial information from an email before signing in to the actual secure website account. Don't use the same password for all your accounts, and change the passwords regularly. And please don't share our guild newsletter. This wasn't the source of the scam, but the information in the newsletter is for guild members only. I'm giving you this information just to remind us all to be careful, not to make you worry. But actually, you know what? Go ahead and worry about it. It's been proven that worrying works. 99% of all the things we worry about never happen!

Quilt Book Reviews by Jodie Banks



We have two new books in the library for those of you who enjoy doing mini quilts. The first is called “Itty Bitty Quilts” by Mari Martin and has 12 seasonal 6 ½ x 6 ½ inch squares. These can be hung on a little quilt stand and changed each month. What a fun décor idea.

The other is called “Mini Marvels”. It is “15 little quilts with big style”. Each quilt is contributed by a different designer. Most of these quilts finish at between 12 to 15 inches. One of the designs is for a wool appliqué project. My favorite has four butterflies appliquéd on four squares. It’s beautiful!

Another new book is “Scrap Quilts Fit for a Queen-Or a King, Twin, or Lap!” There are twelve beautiful quilts featured in the book and each of them has cutting instructions for all four sizes of quilt. Her Skagit Valley Spring quilt features vertical rows of tulips and daffodils. My favorite is pictured on the cover, Merry-Go-Round.

Finally, is the book “Country Girl Modern”. There are 11 modern-traditional quilts in this book. The first one is called Rainbow Connection and would work for our gradated color challenge. The back cover of the book says: “Bring a bit of country to your modern quilts! From a quilt for a modern-day patriot to a vintage modern design to an Amish-inspired quilt, there is something here for every taste-country or city.”

Please remember that to check out books in our guild library, you need to be current in your membership dues



The Basics: Make a (completed) color gradated quilt of any size, colors go from one to another, like a rainbow, not scattered all over the quilt. Finish by November meeting.

Be sure to sign up at quilt guild meeting or email me (brenda@homerealty.com) to get encouraging emails, fun prize, etc.

Idea: I'm making Melissa Corry's ""End of the Rainbow" quilt from her "Irish Chain Quilts" book, it has LOTS of steps, so I am breaking them up to do a bit each month for a November finish! For example, I have to make several "scrappy" blocks to cut up for the blocks in the quilt, so I am doing 1 or 2 colors of them each month.

There are plenty of free patterns out there and lots of ideas on Pinterest, or just Google "gradated quilts" for inspiration!

Recipe of the Month - Overnight Oatmeal by Maureen Tuttle

In a 16-oz jar, mix ½ cup old-fashioned oats, 1 Tbsp chia seeds, 1 Tbsp honey and 2/3 cup milk, almond milk, soy milk, etc. Add dried fruit, nuts, granola, whatever you like. (Add a little extra milk if you like a lot of add-ins.) Give it a good stir, cover and pop it in the fridge overnight – then just wake up, grab it and go! Raw oats contain prebiotic fiber, which helps stimulate the growth of the good bacteria in our bodies. It's yummy cold or warmed in a microwave. Other add-ins could be 1 Tbsp peanut butter or 1 Tbsp unsweetened cocoa powder, or 1 Tbsp chocolate-hazelnut spread to change up the flavor. And it's amazing topped with fresh berries and bananas.






